I would think that every Fellow here tonight vividly recalls his or her first Academy meeting. I know I do! I remember entering the stately Library Room of the Union League Club, working my way through the milling crowd, a virtual "who's who" of New York dentistry, searching for some familiar faces, and certainly feeling like I could use a drink. Without question, the prestigious venue, the formally attired dais, and the grace and dignity of the proceedings were all a little overwhelming for me. If someone would have suggested to me on that evening, that one day I would be standing before you as president of this Academy, I would have thought it the most ludicrous notion I had ever heard. And yet, incredibly, here I stand, humbled, to be granted this great honor and privilege.

In many ways, the Academy that first accepted me into their Fellowship 15 years ago is not the same Academy that we are today. We are, in fact, an organization in the midst of much change. Certainly, this Academy has always stood for the highest levels of Ethics and Professionalism, while providing an exceptional venue for evenings of camaraderie and presentations from nationally recognized speakers. Furthermore, the Academy has always sought to involve our Fellows in some very worthwhile endeavors, such as the Ethics programs at Columbia, NYU, and Stony Brook, as well as a commitment of more than 50 years to the treatment of underprivileged youths at The Boys Club of NY.

But, five years ago, when the Boy's Club closed its doors for the very last time, a palpable void was felt within our organization. He then proceeds to place the rocks, one by one, into the jar. After placing the last rock at the very top, he asks the question: Is the jar full? All of the disciples nod in agreement that the jar is indeed full.

The master then reaches down and places another pail onto the table, from which he takes handfuls of smaller pebbles, which he funnels into the jar, shaking it all the while, until all the spaces between the larger rocks have been filled. He again asks: Is the jar full? Looking around at one another, the students eventually begin to nod in affirmation, although with little conviction.

What have you learned here today? he asks. After a few moments of hesitation, one student raises his hand tentatively, and says: The lesson is that no matter how busy you are, you can always find a way to do more.

The master acknowledges that this is indeed a very worthy thought, but not the message that was really intended.

Another student finally speaks up: You have to put the big rocks in first. If you put the sand or the small rocks in first, you will never be able to put the big rocks in. The Master smiles and nods his approval that the lesson has indeed been learned.

This story is obviously about establishing priorities, determining the basic principles we choose to live by and the fundamental goals we wish to achieve. These are the big rocks, around which everything else, ultimately, revolves. When it comes to our personal and professional lives, we have all decided for ourselves what the big rocks are. As for our Academy, however, we have recently begun to re-evaluate how this organization can best serve our profession and our community.

During the past 4-5 years, the inspired efforts of a few highly dedicated Fellows have guided us into new territory in three specific areas. (1) We now directly sponsor summer research programs at three local dental schools. (2) We have committed our organization to actively support the Donated Dental Services Program, with growing numbers of our Fellows providing free dental care to patients in need. (3) Our newest endeavor. wherein a number of our Fellows have been working diligently, laying groundwork which will facilitate our involvement in humanitarian missions. both domestic and overseas.

Although we have accomplished a great deal in a relatively short time, I believe

If not for the influence of these role models in shaping my professional career, there is little chance that I would be standing here before you this evening. We still need more of the smaller rocks, representing greater participation of our Fellows, as well as the sand, the mortar of common purpose which unites our organization in support of these endeavors. It was once said that: "A man who works with his hands is a laborer: a man who works with his hands and his brains is a craftsman; but, a man who works with his hands, his brain and his heart is an artist." A few of our Fellows have already participated, or are scheduled to participate in humanitarian missions in various parts of the world, and they certainly deserve our appreciation and recognition, for this is no small undertaking. Understandably, spending a week or two at a remote mission may not be for everybody, and maybe only a small number will ever go, but a little pro bono dental treatment in the comfort of our own offices is something we all can do, and I urge anybody who has not already volunteered to participate in the Donated Dental Services program, to please do so. The patient waiting list is long, the need is great, and it has never been this easy for any of us to do something worthwhile in the way of payback.

In closing, I would like to thank George Sferra, who has done an outstanding job in leading us this past year, as well as Steve Syrup and the rest of the program committee for their efforts in putting together an outstanding program for the coming year. I would also like to acknowledge the many highly committed Fellows, who have previously served their terms as officers, and stood before you as presidents of this Academy, and yet continue to come to each and every Board meeting, taking a most active part in the running of this organization. In many ways they constitute the heart and soul of this Fellowship, and their dedication has been exemplary to all of us. It is with their legacy in mind that I humbly accept the honor, the privilege and the challenge of presidency for the coming year.

CORRELATION BETWEEN MODE OF DELIVERY, S. MUTANS COLONIZATION AND EARLY CHILDHOOD CARIES IN THAI CHILDREN

Introduction: The mode of delivery and other maternal factors contribute to the acquisition of S. mutans in infants, which may lead to differences in caries experience in later years.

Objectives: To determine the association between the mode of delivery and other maternal factors with the colonization of S. mutans and caries experience in a group of Thai children.

Method: A total of 350 mothers and their 3-or 5-year-old children were randomly selected from a Health Promotion Hospital in Chiang Mai, Thailand; 185 and 165 of the children were born vaginally or by caesarean section, respectively. Caries experiences of the mothers and children were examined. S. mutans colonization was assessed by using Dentocult® SM Strip Mutans method (Orion Diagnostica) and quantitative real-time PCR. Information on childcare history, dietary and oral health practices were obtained by a questionnaire survey of the mothers, analyzed using SPSS. 15.0.

Results: Very high S. mutans colonization (strip mutans score = 3) was found in 3-year-old (49%) vaginally-born children (p = 0.018). Three-year-old vaginally born children experienced more caries (64.9%) compared with age-matched caesarean born children (45.9) (p < 0.001) with higher mean DMFS score $(6.8 \pm 10.3 \text{ vs.} 4.3 \pm 7.6;$ p < 0.001). An association was also found between S. mutans colonization and ECC prevalence (p < 0.001). Other maternal factors associated with more caries in the children included chewing food to feed their child (p = 0.002) and bottle feeding at bed time (p = 0.04).

Conclusion: This preliminary study demonstrates that maternal mode of delivery and feeding practices were associated with S. mutans colonization and caries status in a population of Thai children.

EXPRESSION OF ATHEROGENIC MARKERS IN CHRONIC PERIODONTITIS BY P. GINGIVALIS STIMULATED DENDRITIC CELLS

Recent evidence has shown that dendritic cells infiltrate atherosclerotic plaques and express atherogenic markers of plaque instability including Hsp-70, C1Q, CCR2, CXCL16 and Hsp- 60. The sources of these dendritic cells in atherosclerotic plaques and the expression of these markers in chronic periodontitis (CP) is unclear. This is especially pertinent in view of histological evidence for activation and mobilization of dendritic cells in CP tissues and for evidence linking CP to coronary artery disease. We analyzed the expression of Hsp-70, C1q, CCR2, CXCL16 and Hsp-60 in human dendritic cells stimulated with the periodontal pathogen P.gingivalis (Pg) in vitro and in gingival tissues from patients with CP in situ.

EXPECTATIONS AND PERCEPTIONS OF AN ELECTRONIC ORAL HEALTH **RECORD (EOHR) SYSTEM IN AN ACADEMIC INSTITUTION**

Introduction: Electronic health records have become a necessity for forward progress in the health care industry. However, there are many misconceptions about how electronic oral health records (EoHRs) will affect clinical management from the point of view of the students and faculty members. These misconceptions often create a barrier to proper implementation of the EoHR system, decrease efficiency and increase costs. We posit that that if students' and faculty's expectations and perceptions are understood before implementation, the transition to EoHRs will occur with fewer setbacks. This allows for the system implementers to focus on the most pressing issues, creating a better overall product. It is essential to reduce these misconceptions at the inception of the implementation process and to keep all members involved positively focused to enable the implementation process to run more smoothly.

Purpose: To evaluate the current expectations, perceptions and misperceptions of Columbia's College of Dental Medicine (CDM) students and faculty members from an EoHR system. This will allow for a more efficient implementation of the EoHR system that CDM has chosen.

Methods and Materials: This crosssectional design was administered via SurveyMonkey.com. Twenty two statements were given and responders were able to choose options from a five point Likert scale. At the end of the survey, participants had the option to leave a comment. The study sample was sixty six (N=66). 26 faculty members, 40 3rd and 4th Year students participated. Inclusion criteria included health care professionals that will be using the EoHR system.

Results:

Comments given at the end of the survey:

- "All of this depends on getting the trust of users and user support. Users will be the key for a successful implementation."
- "We have done this in a large private practice, and I am not a computer expert. It was easy and significantly better. We no longer misplace charts or radiographs."
- "For obvious reasons, electronic dental records will be a huge improvement for everyone involved...It will be great for students who want to review their patient's chart the night before an appointment but the records office is closed....Most importantly, it will be easier to read notes made by previous practitioners. It is so frustrating and possibly even DANGEROUS, when I can't make out the notes made in the chart by some previous student with terrible handwriting. It's 2009, there is no reason we should be putting our patients at risk because of illegible handwriting."

Conclusions: When comparing the expectations from the system of the students and the faculty members it is evident that the students expect more and are quite optimistic about the transition and implementation process. The percentage of responders that believe that electronic health records will improve health care quality is comparable and continued on page 7

even a little higher to other studies in similar environments.^{1,2} A common and important barrier to implementation is the belief that learning to use the system will be tough and frustrating.³ This is somewhat true at our institution as well, though students believe that it will be easier than faculty members. The mixed responses shown through figures 2 and 3 represent the variety of effects that electronic health records can have on efficiency.

It has been shown that at times using EHR systems can lead to increased documentation time, but at other times can improve effectiveness and allow for faster results as compared to paper charts.4 The range of efficiency of EHRs were due to the type of system used as well the specific items being documented.

Perhaps the most important finding was the realization of the importance to correct faculty's misperceptions long before those of the students. Many students look up to the faculty members and often take what they say for fact. Therefore if faculty members have false perceptions or even negative outlooks, it will greatly modify attitudes of the students. A negative attitude will greatly hinder the implementation process.

VERTICAL AUGMENTATION OF POSTERIOR MANDIBLE AND ANTERIOR MAXILLA: SURGICAL SOLUTIONS IN AN OFFICE SETTING

Michael S. Block, DMD October 8, 2009

Patients often present with 5-6 mm of bone superior to the inferior alveolar canal with the desire to receive a fixed implant borne restoration. Patients also present with the need to 5 mm of vertical augmentation in the anterior maxilla to recreate lost bone for esthetic restorations. This presentation will focus on the use of interpositional osteotomy methods to vertically augment the atrophic ridge. The procedures are performed in the office with implant placement approximately four months after the augmentation with minimal morbidity.

Dr. Michael Block graduated from the University of Rochester in 1975, attaining both a BA in Biology and a BS in Biomedical Engineering. He completed his dental training at the Harvard School of Dental Medicine in 1979, receiving his DMD cum laude in a special field. He completed his residency program in Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery at the LSU School of Dentistry in 1983, where he remained on the faculty and achieved the academic rank of Professor in the Department of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery. Currently he has joined with Dr. Paulino Castellon in creation of the Center for Dental Reconstruction, a private practice dedicated to patient oriented care.

Dr. Block is the editor-in-hief of four textbooks on dental implants: Endosseous Implants for Maxillofacial Reconstruction; Implants in Dentistry; Color Atlas of Dental Implant Surgery – Edition 1; a second edition of the Color Atlas of Dental Implant Surgery was released in 2007, and a new third edition, with videos, was released in 2010. He is Past President of the Academy of Osseointegration, and has been program chair for three of their annual programs. Dr. Block serves on the American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons (AAOMS) Committee on Continuing Education. Dr. Block has been an examiner for the American Board of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery. He is a Section Editor on Dental Implants for the "Journal of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery".

Dr. Block is particularly interested in the translation of technology for efficient and predictable reconstruction of the jaw to provide ideal bone for implant placement and esthetic replacement of missing teeth, the use of multiple techniques and implants to reconstruct significant atrophic conditions, and interceptive strategies for rehabilitation extraction sites with implant restorations.

EVOLVING TRENDS IN IMPLANT RESTORATIVE DENTISTRY

Successes with dental implants have allowed the development of treatment planning philosophy focused on preventative and interceptive prosthodontics. Dental implants provide the opportunity for simplified restorative options via single unit dentistry. With the modern technology we can utilize a proactive method combining knowledge and experience to meet the needs of the patient and practitioner. Dr. John Davliakos is involved with the surgical placement and prosthetic reconstruction of dental implant patients. He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania School of Dental Medicine in 1984. Dr. Davliakos completed his prosthodontic residency in 1986 and a fellowship in Oral Implantology in 1987 at the University of Pittsburgh. He was an assistant professor in the post-graduate prosthodontic program at the University of Maryland, Baltimore College of Dental Surgery from 1990 to 1997. Dr. Davliakos maintains a private practice in Annapolis, MD.

ACUTE HIV INFECTION: NEW FRONTIERS FOR HIV PREVENTION

Antonio E. Urbina, MD

January 14, 2010

Acute HIV Infection (AHI) is the first stage of HIV infection and lasts approximately 54 days. Everyone that becomes infected with HIV will go through AHI. Two out of every three people who go through AHI will be symptomatic. Typical symptoms include fever, rash, lymphadenoapthy, myalgias, sore throat and headache. Often these symptoms are easily mistaken for other acute viral syndromes, like influenza or mononucleosis.

Because persons in AHI can be up to 3,000 times more infectious than persons with chronic HIV infection, detecting persons in AHI can have enormous public health benefit. As typical antibody testing, including rapid tests, are only able to detect infections that are at least one month old, testing for virus via viral load testing is required to diagnose AHI. Although this technology has been available for several years, the majority of persons who present with AHI are infrequently diagnosed.

Dr. Antonio E. Urbina received his MD from the University of Florida on 1992. He completed a residency in Internal Medicine at St. Vincent Catholic Medical Center-Manhattan in 1995. Currently, he serves as an Assistant Professor of Medicine and Associate Professor in the School of Public Health at New York Medical College. In October 2008, Dr. Urbina was inducted into the Presidential Advisory Council (PACHA) on HIV/AIDS, a four year advisory council position that will help shape the future of the national AIDS strategy in the United States.

Dr. Urbina has practiced HIV medicine in New York City for more than a decade. Since 2003, Dr. Urbina has served as the Medical Director for the HIV/AIDS education and training program at St. Vincent Catholic Medical Center - the largest HIV education department in New York State. In this position, Dr. Urbina has pioneered innovative educational programming for community based clinics, hospitals and public health departments. He also serves as the Principal Investigator for the Clinical Education Initiative of the New York State DOH AIDS Institute, the New York/New Jersey AIDS Education and Treatment Center at St. Vincent Catholic Medical Center, and the Maintenance in Care Initiative for the NYC DOH, a program designed to bring HIV positive patients lost to care back into treatment.

Dr. Urbina maintains a busy private and clinic-based practice at St. Vincent Catholic Medical Center, providing HIV and primary care treatment to over 300 patients. Moreover, Dr. Urbina is actively involved in HIV research and has directed more than ten HIV clinical trials research protocols.

Dr. Urbina has published in the journal Clinical Infectious Diseases on Crystal Methamphetamine and ARV Interactions, a book chapter on the clinical management of the HIV infected substance user, and in the New York Times on the public health benefits of conducting pooled HIV viral load testing. Dr. Urbina has co-produced two widely acclaimed educational videos on Acute HIV Infection and Immigration and HIV in NYC.

Dr. Urbina is a well known national lecturer on the various topics related to the clinical management and prevention of HIV.

STEM CELLS AND THE FUTURE OF DENTISTRY Jeremy Mao, PHD

February 11, 2010

What are stem cells? As dentists, why should we be concerned with stem cells? How would stem cells change dental practice? Is it possible to grow a tooth or TMJ with stem cells? This lecture summarizes the latest stem cell research and development for dental, oral and craniofacial applications. Stem cell research and development will, over time, transform dental practice in a magnitude that is far greater than amalgam or dental implants. Metallic alloys, composites and even titanium implants are not permanent solutions. In contract, stem cell technology

will generate native tissue analogs that are compatible with the patient's own.

Dr. Jeremy Mao is currently Professor of Dental Medicine at Columbia University, and Director of the Center for Craniofacial Regeneration at Columbia University Medical Center. Dr. Mao has published over 200 scientific papers, proceedings and book chapters in the area of tissue engineering, stem cells and regenerative medicine. He currently serves on the editorial board of several scientific journals such as Tissue Engineering, Journal of Biomedical Material Research, Bio-fabrication, International Journal of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery, Angle Orthodontics, Journal of Dental Research, Stem Cells & Therapeutics, Journal of Endodontics and Journal of Orthopedic Ssurgery and Research, and has served as an Associate Editor of Stem Cells and Developments, as well as on the editorial board of Medical Engineering and Physics and Frontiers of Bioscience. Dr. Mao is editor of a new book entitled "Translational Approaches in Tissue Engineering and Regenerative Medicine". Dr. Mao is also the editor of upcoming

books entitled "Principles of Craniofacial Growth and Development" and "Bio-engineering of Wound Healing".

Dr. Mao is currently a fellow of the American Institute of Biological and Medical Engineers, and received numerous awards for his scientific accomplishments, including the Yasuda Award for Excellence in Biomedical Research and Whitaker Fellow. Dr. Mao has over 50 patents granted and/or filed in the areas of stem cells, tissue engineering and regenerative medicine, leading to the incorporation of two biotechnology companies. Dr. Mao is a standing member of the Musculoskeletal Tissue Engineering Study Section of the NIH and serves on review panels for NIH, NSF, Human Frontier Science Program, Medical Research Council of Great Britain, Wellcome Trust, United Kingdom, CIHR, Canada, DARPA; DOD; Israel Science Council, Netherlands Organization for Scientific Research (Dutch

Research Council), Smithsonian Institute, Science and Engineering Council of Singapore, Innovation and Technology Division, Hong Kong; Michigan Skeletal Center, Pittsburgh Tissue Engineering Initiative, Science Foundation Ireland; Louisiana State; California Institute of Regenerative Medicine; Natural Science and Engineering Council of Canada; Illinois Institute of Regenerative Medicine; US Army; Skeletal Center, Pittsburgh Tissue Engineering Initiative, Science Foundation Ireland, Human Frontier Science Program; China Natural Science Foundation including Panelist for NIH Director's Pioneer Awards.

Dr. Mao has been invited to give over 260 keynote, plenary and named lectures. He has chaired multiple international scientific conferences, including an NIH-sponsored Stem Cells and Tissue Engineering Conference in 2006. Dr. Mao's laboratory is currently funded by research grants from the National Institutes of Health and also from industry. His laboratory has trained over 120 graduate students and postdoctoral research scientists, some of whom are successful faculty members at universities in the U.S. and overseas, whereas others are leaders in biotech industry.

Dr. Mao is a consultant to several Tissue Engineering and Regenerative Medicine centers and companies in the United States and overseas. His pioneer research in stem cells and tissue engineering has been featured by NIH, NIDCR, NIBIB, American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons, American Dental Association, American Association of Plastic Surgeons, etc. and by public and professional media such as CNN, New York Times, Chicago Tribune, NBC, CBS, BBC, Der Speigel, Nature, Reader's Digest, FASEB Journal, Forbes and Lancet Oncology.

EXCESS GINGIVAL DISPLAY – DIFFERENTIAL DIAGNOSIS AND TREATMENT

J. William Robbins, DDS, MA

Comprehensive esthetic restorative dentistry involves much more than choosing the correct tooth shade. It requires an understanding of facial esthetics and the interrelationship of the parts including the lips, gingival and teeth. Guidelines for esthetic diagnosis will be presented. These guidelines will then be used to diagnose and develop treatment strategies for the patient with "excess gingival display". This condition can occur as a result of one or a combination of factors, including short or hyperactive maxillary lip, short teeth due to wear and/or altered passive eruption, dentoalveolar extrusion and vertical maxillary excess. This lecture will discuss an interdisciplinary approach to treatment, including orthodontics, periodontics, oral and maxillofacial surgery and restorative dentistry.

J. William Robbins, DDS, MA, maintains a full-time private practice and is Clinical Professor in the Department of General Dentistry at the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio Dental School. He graduated from the University of Tennessee Dental School in 1973. He completed a rotating internship at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Leavenworth Kansas and a 20-year General Practice Residency at the V.A. Hospital in San Diego, California. Dr. Robbins has published over 80 articles, abstracts and chapters on a wide range of dental subjects and has lectured in the United States, Canada, Mexico, South America, Europe, the Middle East and Africa. He coauthored a textbook, Fundamentals of Operative Dentistry - A Contemporary Approach, which is published by Quintessence, and is in its

3rd edition. He has won several awards, including the Presidential Teaching Award at the University of Texas Health Science Center, the 2002 Dentist of the Year, the Fellowship Award and the 2003 Honorary Thaddeus C. Weclew Fellowship Award from the Academy of General Dentistry. He is a Diplomate of the Federal Services Board of General Dentistry and the American Board of General Dentistry and is a past president of the American Board of General Dentistry. He is a member of several organizations, including the American College of Dentists, the International College of Dentists, the American Dental Association, the American Academy of Restorative Dentistry, the Southwest Academy of Restorative Dentistry, the Academy of General Dentistry, and the Academy of Operative Dentistry.

Report of the President:

Report of the Education Committee:

As I reported last year, after a number of years discussing the idea of a think tank – social gathering to brainstorm about the NYAD Dental Ethics Program represented at the three local dental institutions with the Education Committee, we pulled it off in grand style in October of 2008. However, the event was so successfully hosted by Colleen Cournot, we have scheduled the Second Annual Esprit De Corp Gathering for March 18th, hosted by Colleen and Andrew Krieger in Andrew's suite, which has a spectacular view from high above Manhattan.

The event was conceived as a brainstorming session, training session and social gathering of fellow facilitators, prospective facilitators, spouses and friends with good eats and wine. While last year's event may be hard to beat, we intend to try by any means deemed ethical. Fred More has agreed to conduct a training session utilizing ethical scenarios involving all present in what I call a parlor game. These experiences have proved interesting in the past. And, with Fred's experience and skill, this promises to be a highpoint, only to be topped by the good fellowship. So be there or be square.

There has been a recent infusion of new Fellows in the American College of Dentists who practice near Stony Brook and with John Scarola's guidance and determination, many of them are assisting as facilitators in the rejuvenated Dental Ethics Program. The prizes are to be about \$150 each. These choices, when selected, will total about \$80-\$100.

The Education Committee was also recently given the charge of overseeing the NYAD student Summer Research Award of \$4000 that was begun by Tom Connolly's administration. The grant has been going to Columbia and NYU for a few years, but Stony Brook has recently joined the project. The Board recently approved the additional \$4000 funding. The student grant recipients, selected by the respective schools, will present a poster or table clinic on their research at the February meeting and submit an article for publication in the Annals. The arrangements for this are to be coordinated by the committee, with Carol Bensky and the respective schools.

The textbook issue and funding considerations or options have been with us for a few years. We purchased the last of the first edition of "Ethical Questions in Dentistry" years ago. Depending on the number of books I get back in mid-March from the Columbia senior class, by September we could be in trouble getting through next year's dental ethics program. We could consider trying to get books returned from facilitators who doubt they will participate in the future, but I doubt many books would come back. If I get 40 back from students, it might get us through another year, depending on the number of new facilitators coming on board who would then need the first edition books.

We would probably need about 200 books (for junior and senior – about 40

books per class), allowing for some attrition, about 100 books, and another 60 or 70 books for facilitators, plus reserve, would be an additional 100 books. My contact at Quintessence is no longer there but I could likely get a 20% discount (must check current fee for "Ethical Questions in Dentistry" but its now around \$35. If I can get at least a 20% discount and use the NYAD tax free number, we would need \$5600-\$7000 to convert to the second edition of "Ethical Questions in Dentistry" by Rule and Veatch. Perhaps the NY Section of the ACD and the NYAD can share the burden. but we may need the books by September.

All the duties of the Education Committee have been accomplished, especially in successfully organizing and producing the 17th year of the Dental Ethics Program at Columbia and NYU and now at Stony Brook.

The budget for next year is \$2000, not including the awards for the Student Summer Research grants.
